## **PLAC** WALDZKI

Once the site of several villages, today it is the very centre of the city. Grunwaldzki Square is a combination of unique architecture, many academic centres and office buildings.

Formerly, it was dominated by tenement houses, but a lot has changed due to the decision of the military authorities of Festung Breslau to build a temporary military airport on the axis of Grunwaldzki Bridge – Szczytnicki Bridge. As a result, many buildings were demo-

After the war, for several years the housing estate was associated mainly with the largest market in the city, the so-called szaberplatz. At the beginning of the 1950s, the area began to be redeveloped. Over the years, university premises, student residences - the famous "Dwudziestolatka", "Parawanowiec", "Kredka" and "Ołówek" - as well as residential buildings were built.

One of the most recognisable buildings on Grunwaldzki Square are the Sedesowce" (Toilet blocks) designed in 1967 by Jadwiga Grabowska-Hawryak. This establishment consists of six sixteen-storey blocks of flats of unique construction. The estate also houses faculties and institutes of the University of Life Sciences, Medical University, Wroclaw University of Technology.

The inhabitants of the Square enjoy walking along the Odra's embankments and watching ships or canoes sailing on the river. Another characteristic place is the Reagan Roundabout, which is one of the most important transfer centres in the entire city. The blue Grunwaldzki Bridge from behind which its white "Sedesowce" emerge, is one of Wrocław's most famous landscapes.

In the tenement houses on both sides of Norwida Street lived the families of professors. While fleeing, they allegedly left their possessions and buried their treasures, hoping that they would return. My grandma and mum said that when someone would come, look at and show to themselves these tenement houses, they always wondered whether they were the owners. At the doorway number 11, a certain gentleman bought the apartment formerly belonging to his family, ordered it to be renovated and left. He left it under my care; if anything would happen, the workers were to come to me. A painter once came, saying that he had made a discovery by scraping a piece of plaster in the apartment being renovated. He told me to go and see what he found. In the ceiling, there was a photo of a German soldier in uniform plastered over. This is what the Germans did back then. 


